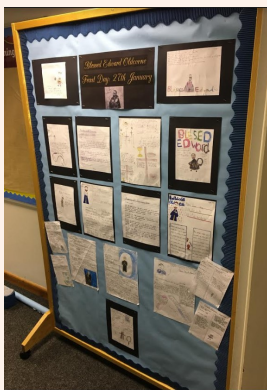

St Joseph's pupils spent time reflecting on the life of Blessed Edward Oldcorne in the lead up to his feast day and produced an excellent display.



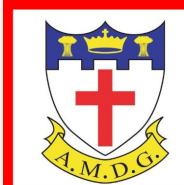
During our morning act of collective worship, students spent the week reflecting on Blessed Edward Oldcorne and our tutor group martyrs.

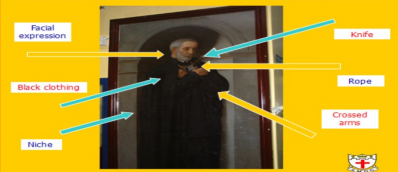

TUTOR GROUP MARTYRS

Class A – Ashley

Blessed Ralph Ashley

Ralph Ashley served as a cook at Douai College France. He went to Spain in 1590 and became a Jesuit Lay Brother. He returned to England in 1598 and served with Father Edward Oldcorne. He was captured in 1604 and was terribly tortured and executed.

Class C – Clitherow

Saint Margaret Clitherow

Margaret Clitherow was a butcher's wife in York. In 1574 Margaret became a Catholic and an active helper of the Douai priests. She also ran a Catholic school for her children and neighbours. Officers found vestments worn by priests in her house and so on 25th March 1580 she was crushed to death. She took a quarter of an hour to die. Her two sons became priests.

Class J – Jones

Saint John Jones

John Jones was a Welshman. He appears in 1587 as a priest working among the Catholics in a Prison. This work was cut short when his disguise was discovered, and he was arrested and imprisoned at Walsby Castle. However he did escape and made his way to the continent. He returned to England in 1592, and two years later was a prisoner once more at Walsby. He was martyred on 12th July 1598. There was an hour's delay in his execution because the hangman had forgotten his rope. Father Jones made use of time in prayer and addressing the crowd.

Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day was on Monday 27th January, the same day as Blessed Edward Oldcorne's Feast Day.

As a college community, we remember Holocaust Memorial Day each year. In our Mass in remembrance of Blessed Edward Oldcorne we pray for the victims of the Holocaust and other genocides that have happened since then. In the foyer students are able to stop and reflect on the Holocaust with this display. This year Mr Jessop led an assembly reflecting on those people who lost their lives in World War II. Students who attended the Battlefields trip in October 2019 researched one person who perished in the war and their research was shared in the assembly.

Tomorrow we begin a week of reflection ending on Saturday the 1st of February in which we think about 12 million people killed in WWII. Let us remember the dead but also the survivors who lived to tell us the stories that keep memories alive for future generations to come.

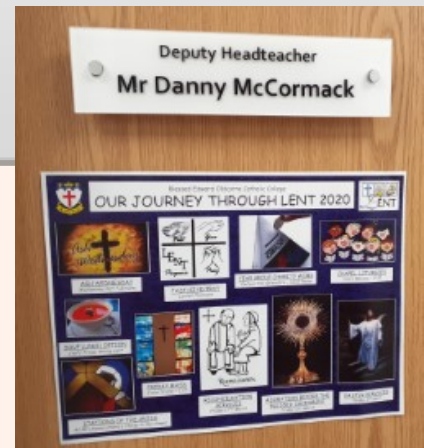

On Thursday 27th February we remembered Anne Line, one of our college tutor martyrs. Anne Line and her husband were both converts to the Catholic faith. Anne was arrested when a priest was saying Mass in her house. The priest escaped but Anne was arrested and died at Tyburn on 27th February 1601.



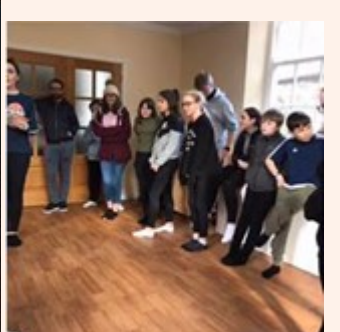
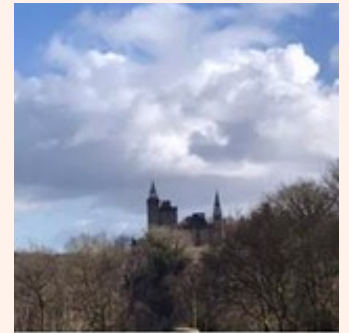
Soli House

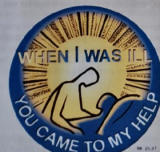

Thinking about the Sacraments in RE Lessons

During RE, our class got a chance to reenact a typical Catholic wedding. Each class member was given a script to follow and read from. This allowed us to understand the prayers and vows that are usually said at a Catholic wedding. The Groom and the Bride were able to say vows and exchange rings like at a usual wedding with a ring bearer and all. An aisle was set up in the classroom and wedding music was played. Whilst this was a mock wedding, the scripts, rings, vows and the priest, played by a member of the class, helped us gain a better understanding of the topic we are studying.

The rings were exchanged as usual, with the same words that would be spoken at a normal wedding, from this we could view the importance of the rings and what they represent. It was a great chance to act out and view a wedding in class as some students may not have attended a wedding before, so it was a useful opportunity for them to see what an actual Catholic wedding would be like.

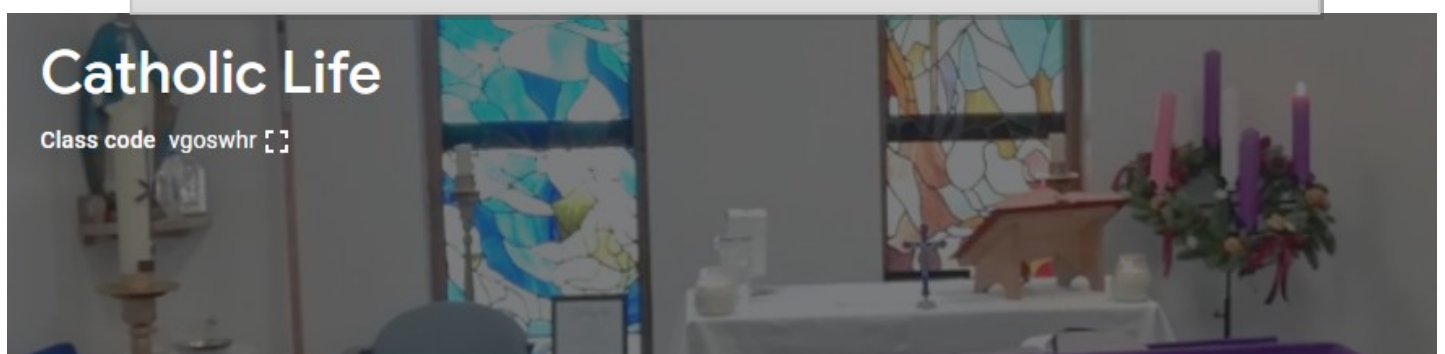

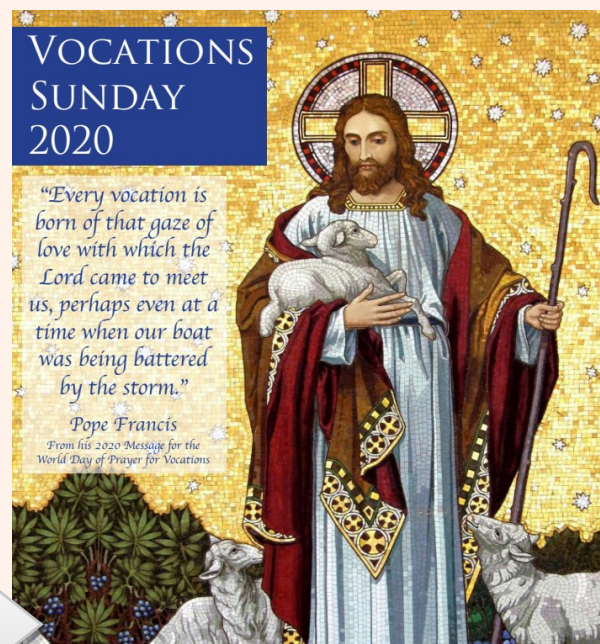

BEGIN with the Sign of the Cross and say the *Apostles Creed*: Leader: "I believe in God the Father the Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ His only Son our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary and became man. For our sake, He was crucified under Pontius Pilate, suffered, died and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day, He rose again according to the scriptures and He ascended into heaven. He is seated at the right hand of God, the Father the Almighty. From thence, He shall come to judge the living and the dead. (All) I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic

Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting. Amen."

OFFER for a special intention. PRAY 1 *Our Father*, 3 Hail Mary, 1 *Glory Be* and "O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy." (Leader) Announce 5 Mysteries and the 1st Mystery. Recite together 1 *Our Father*, 10 *Hail Mary*, 1 *Glory Be* and 1 "O my Jesus." Leader announces 2nd Mystery, etc.

And do thou O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the other evil spirits that prowl through the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen."

CONCLUDE (All) "Hail Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary! (Leader) Pray for us O Holy Mother of God. (All) That we might be made worthy of the promises of Christ."

(Leader) "Let us pray." (All) "O God, who's only begotten Son, by His life, death and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal salvation. Grant we beseech Thee, that by mediating upon these mysteries of the most holy rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may both imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise through the same Christ our Lord. Amen."

FINAL PETITION (Leader) O most Sacred Heart of Jesus . . . (All) Have mercy on us! (3X) (Leader) Immaculate Heart of Mary. (All) Pray for us! (3X) END with Sign of Cross.
