#### SEND: Our new Nurture programme- The PiXL Edge programme

In September 2020, we launched our new Nurture group programme for Years 7,8, and 9. The PiXL Edge is a framework to develop and accredit students with those personal attributes essential for employability and life. The scheme focuses on five key attributes – LORIC skills, these are designed to enable students to learn new skills of Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, and Initiative. Since September 2020 students have completed the Leadership topic and are currently halfway through the Organisation topic.

The content that has been covered:


#### Leadership: -

- Researched and discussed the attributes of a good leader case study.
- Looked at inspirational speeches.
- Wrote about things they felt passionate about and would like to help/change from charities to government policies.
- Discussed empathy and how to empathise with others.
- Researched different charities and organised a charity cake/cookie sale.
- Designed and made a game.
- Students had to compete two evaluations on the topic to gain their certificate.

# **Organisation:** - Studied so far:

- The importance of being organised and the consequences of not being organised.
- Ways to help organise yourself, others, and events.
- Discussed ways to be more organised set themselves some achievable targets.
- Looked at time management planned and baked cakes and did a tasting session.
- Learned how organised thinking can improve problem solving.
- Looked at pr-event, event, and post-event activities.
- Learned about the 'Incubation theory' how to organise thoughts to approach challenges with a clear head.





As part of our quality assurance, it is imperative to talk to and ask students to evaluate their learning. Some recent feedback from students on the Edge programme:

Hans in Year 11, has been selected to attend one of the prestigious National Mathematics Summer Schools, run by the UK Mathematics Trust for the top performing 1% of students in their Intermediate Maths Challenge, a competition entered by thousands of secondary students across the UK and overseas.

Hans scored an incredible 121 marks in the original challenge, only missing out on two questions. He has won Gold certificates in all three years he has participated, and is looking forward to the experience. At each summer school, students take part in demanding and


At each summer school, students take part in demanding and stimulating sessions, led by experienced and dedicated volunteers.

# <u>Top Performances in UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge</u>

Once again, our best mathematicians from Years 9, 10 and 11 sat the UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge In February – almost 100 students in total were involved. This year, the competition was online, meaning that all the students could tackle the challenge from home, during the Spring Term lockdown.

Four students were awarded Gold certificates – Hans (Year 11) who was best in school, with an amazing score of 121 along with Zeb and Georgia from Year 11, and Mariya from Year 10, who also scored 100. Edward was best in Year 9, and was awarded a silver certificate. All five were invited to participate in follow-on competitions, more than we have ever had at this level. Following close behind were another 19 students, who all won Silver certificates:

The best performing students in the Intermediate Maths Challenge earlier this year were invited to take part in the prestigious follow-on competitions.

The "Grey Kangaroo" competition is for the top Year 9 students and Edward sat this paper for the first time, scoring a very creditable 57 marks to earn his participation award.

Zeb, Georgia (both Year 11) and Mariya (Year 10) sat the advanced "Pink Kangaroo" challenge, all performing very well, with Zeb frustratingly being just one mark away from a Merit Award.

Our "Best in School" student from the Intermediate Challenge, Hans, scored so highly that he was invited to take part in the Intermediate Maths Olympiad, which is a 2 hour written paper, with just 5 questions!

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### **Labour Market Information**

During circle time students have been busy learning about Labour Market Information (LMI). LMI is a useful tool to help research future jobs, understand the skills needed for certain roles and demand for future employment. The world is moving very fast and things are changing all the time, new technologies and industry changes are creating new jobs and making others obsolete. If young people have access to accurate and up-to-date information they are better equipped to make an informed choice and plan appropriately.

Creative and digital, information and communication technology, hi-tech engineering, life sciences and tourism are all examples of sectors that contribute hugely to the UK economy and a lot of the new jobs available to young people will be in these industries. A relatively new sector often termed the 'green economy', offers a variety of roles which will help the government meet its environmental targets.

LMI indicates that we'll also see demand for people to join the hospitality, construction, agritech and logistics sectors. As life expectancy grows they'll be a huge demand for care and health workers across a range of jobs. As a parent or carer, you'll probably be a big influence on your child's future career plans. # **Humanities - Population & Migration**

Year 7 Geographers have been investigating how populations rise and fall and the reasons behind this, such as improved healthcare leading to an increased life expectancy. Students have investigated why some countries manage their populations looking at China's one child policy and at Russia's encouragement for families to have more than two children due to their declining population. They are now looking at why people move and the benefits and negative impacts that migration has on both the country they have left and the country they are moving to, looking at Mexico to USA migration and also why people leave countries such as Eritrea in Africa to countries in Europe.

Year 9 Historians have also been evaluating the impact of migration and it's link to racism and discrimination. We began by looking at the impact of the Black Lives Matter protests in 2020 and the Hostile Environment scandal in

2017. We have showed how the effects of the transatlantic slave trade can still be seen in British cities today. We were able to discuss and evaluate whether removing statues or changing street names actually erases History. More recently we have shown post-war migration, beginning in 1948 with the Windrush Generation. A debate on the pros and cons of immigration has investigated the negative experiences for minority groups despite showing that, without it, Britain would be culturally and economically poorer.








#### Year 8 Science Club

#### Key Stage 3 English

This year we have introduced an exciting new English curriculum for our Key Stage 3 students, which introduces them to canonical works across a range of literary genres, including adventure, gothic, sci-fi and bildungsroman. Our texts have been selected to ensure students have the opportunity to read and explore some of the best literature ever written. Our new curriculum emphasises timeless concepts such as family, justice, kingship and social class, while also introducing students to challenging new literary concepts like foreshadowing, the unreliable narrator, liminality and the Byronic hero.

One of our most popular new texts this year with Years 7 and 8 has been H.G. Wells' The Island of Dr Moreau, a late Victorian science fiction novel, which offers a sinister warning against pushing the boundaries of scientific research beyond what is ethical. Our Year 7 students explain more ...

"After being shipwrecked, Edward Prendick winds up on an island and discovers the man named Moreau who was 'howled out' of the country for inhumane practices who is now creating human-animal hybrids on the island." (Joseph) "Dr Moreau is a scientist trying to turn animals into humans. To his horror, Prendick thinks Moreau is experimenting on humans. This makes him realise he might be in danger. Will he get experimented on too?" (Martha)

"As Prendick explores the island, he finds horrors which could drive a man insane." (Jakub)

"Dr Moreau is a very secretive and mysterious character, and a bit ambiguous." (Megan)

Having whetted their appetite for science fiction and the gothic, students can look forward to studying Frankenstein, The Strange Case of Jekyll and Hyde, Dracula, Jane Eyre and Wuthering Heights as they progress through Key Stage 3.


