The school year is coming to an end and this year, like the previous year it has been hard on every single student and their families. Learning is a key part of every child's development and at Blessed Edward Oldcorne Catholic Collage we are striving to focus on this point. However this is hard, especially when absence rates for our children are so high. As an example on the 29th June only 41% of students were present in school due to Covid related issues affecting the rest. This equates to 347 students present out of a possible 840. These figures worsened for a short time as we had to send around 40 Year 7 students home soon after this data was collated. Numbers are changing all the time. Being vigilant and taking every care to protect ourselves and others is still a huge responsibility for each one of us. Please work with the school to keep our children and families safe.

Co-producing, it's all about working together

It is so important that when trying to understand how best to support a young person with SEND we work as part of team. We are part of a whole school community where just like a ship Captain and crew we all have different journeys to navigate. A young person with SEND is on a journey, just like you think of the ship as having to be constantly in motion, a ship always has to make correctional changes to reach its target, a ship has a captain that decides on direction, a ship has a crew who needs to be working together to help the ship reach its destination. A ship could be considered as going on an adventure. We are part of the ship's crew. The ship is useless on its own it needs a crew that communicates, plans, and thinks ahead. It needs to problem solve when there are storms along the journey, it needs to allow others to come aboard to support when the crew may need fresh ideas, other knowledge or skills. Everyone on board needs to be resilient, focused and have the shared goals at the centre of the outcomes. Co-production is best when all stakeholders work together with a young person to share information. We intend to make sure there is a thorough approach to providing each student with as many opportunities and support as needed, to experience emotional stability to learn and wellbeing to be educated. We work on initiatives co-providing, assessing, reviewing, discussing, evaluating in order to learn and grow together. We all work on co-delivery of services, including peer support, buddying, mentoring and lesson support.

Each students needs vary, even if they have similar learning or additional needs.

Parents "A" have a son currently in Key Stage 3 and have shared that:

"As parents we are delighted with the high level of support our child receives from the SEND department. Right from the start, before he became a student at the college, I was given the opportunity to discuss his disability and learning needs with the SENDco. My son was offered an additional transition day in Year 6 which he found very helpful. I had an opportunity to discuss more practical issues he can present with in terms of his presentation and learning needs with his experienced Learning Support Mentor. As my child had other agencies involved in supporting his medical and social needs the school needed to work collaboratively with his consultant paediatrician, consultant psychologist, occupational therapist, psychotherapist as well as his post adoption social worker. This was done well, and actions put into place. The SENDco also engaged in the EHCP process, where the local authority SEND service refused to assess my child's needs. With the help of the college this decision was overturned as the SENDco worked with the Complex Communication Needs teacher and educational psychologist who assessed our son. The findings of the report were put into place and the SENDco worked hard to make sure that the Head of Year, Form Tutor and all subject teachers and mentoring staff were aware of how to support our son to achieve his potential.

Our son had a few difficult experiences at the beginning of his student life and the SENDco, as well as his Learning Support Mentor and Head of Year, responded promptly and have been extremely supportive of me as a parent, listening, offering advice and support. Without the additional scaffolding offered by the SEND department I am unsure how much my son would be able to access both educationally and socially, despite being a very intelligent young man. The staff in the department were always accessible to me, either by email or by phone. The particular challenges of the worldwide pandemic haven't affected my son at school much - with his learning support mentor understanding his anxiety over covid. Over the years my son had support at the beginning of the school day, meet & greet, end of school day, every lunchtime 1 to 1 support with support to reengage in the lunch free time, support with his diary, how to study, how to do



homework, how to make friends, supervision when needed etc. My son has an excellent relationship with his Learning Support Mentor and has no qualms about asking for help. The department always responded promptly as need arose, but when required has been proactive in planning forward to meet likely future need.

I cannot rate the SEND support at the school highly enough - for my child AND for me as his parent. This is what home/school relationship should look like in all schools."

Parents "B" have a daughter with an Educational Health Care Plan and have shared:

"Once we knew our daughter had a place at Blessed Edwards Oldcorne Catholic School Mrs Fitzer (SENDco) arranged transition days so she could familiarise herself with the school because it was a big jump from primary school to high school.

Mrs Fitzer arranged a meeting at the school to go through our daughter's EHCP so she could put into place the resources that she would need on a day to day basis.

Mrs Fitzer also liaises with other agencies to visit and assess our daughter. We are given updates of these visits and programmes within school that she can access to help with her self-esteem and confidence. In the first couple of weeks our daughter was met by a Learning Support Mentor (TA) at the gate to take into school which was brilliant as this gave her the confidence to do this by herself.

Year on year we meet to review our daughter's progress against her EHCP, the last 12 months have been a challenge to meet due to the pandemic but again technology has allowed us to review her progress and stay in touch with all her teachers and key staff.

The biggest benefit to us as parents is that we can pick up the phone or send an email if we need to discuss homework etc ...we always get a quick response back.

Our daughter has also benefited from having a Mentor that helps her in class and on a one to one basis to concentrate on learning, experiencing life skills outside of the curriculum and to be able to function in the outside world after school.

We feel that co-production is very important because as parents we can get involved working with teachers to improve the educational development of our children.

We are very grateful for the support from the SEND team, Headteacher and Teachers at the school to help our daughter with her learning needs and keeping her safe and happy."

Parent "C", who has a son in Key Stage 3 has worked closely with school this academic year, in what has been an even more challenging year than it would ordinarily have been, has shared that:

"Co-production works for us. Since my son started in Year 7 at Blessed Edwards Oldcorne Catholic College the SEND team have worked closely with us. They have worked with me to establish what support is needed. I have been very happy with the results in this academic year. This has also led to a happier and calmer home life. This also results in a mum who is less stressed and more relaxed when he is at school knowing we have worked together for the best possible plans for my son. We are continuing to find out what works for him and what doesn't."

Co-production is the best way for us to support and take students on their journey through their secondary school education. There are often challenges and difficult conversations that take place, parents who have children with SEND needs frequently have multiple agencies to deal with and can struggle to get the support that they need for their child. It isn't always straightforward and there are times where we need to problem solve, have honest and frank discussions and work on restorative practices. It is imperative that parents and all key staff are involved in moving forward to find suitable solutions.



This term, Year 8 students have been studying Fashion in MFL lessons, Year 8 German students (and teachers!) took part in a Fashion Show on 27th May in the Main Hall. Students used the catwalk to show off their outfits and described them in German. It was great to see Year 8s enjoying themselves and practising their Languages at the same time. The winning group was the "Supermärkte" who made their

outfits from different Supermarket plastic bags. A special thanks to Harry who coordinated all of the presentations for the day. We can't wait for the Spanish catwalk show in July.

In Science we have taken advantage of the recent nice weather and spent some Ecology lessons outside by the School Pond. We used our classification keys to identify different organisms within and around the water, which has allowed us a better understanding of how they fit within that ecosystem. Students identified lots of different plants and animals, which we used to create potential food webs back in the classroom, showing us the interdependence within that community. Our favourite catches were the Smooth Newts and the prettiest things we saw were the Common Blue Damselflies. We also spotted a recently vacated birds nest in the nearby hedge, showing how the pond can provide a food source for non-aquatic animals too! We are hoping for good weather in September so we can continue our investigations and compare the area between the seasons.




The Frayer Model

Virtual Work Experience opens up the possibility for students to explore new jobs and industries in a way that may not have been possible under face to face arrangements.



I am absolutely delighted to be planning our next First World War Battlefields trip to Belgium & France between Friday 21st and Monday 24th October 2022. This coincides with the autumn half term break. The Battlefields Trip usually takes place every other year and therefore we would have been going in 2021, but current events have somewhat scuppered our plans. Fortunately, schools have been given permission to organise trips abroad from September onwards.

Those who sign up will gain a first hand experience of the region where most of the fighting took place including the conditions in the Trenches. They will be able to visit a number of museums and sites dedicated to the memory of the soldiers who lost their lives including a number of war cemeteries and participation in the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate at Ypres. We would also like to provide individuals the opportunity to investigate their own family history where appropriate.

This visit has been planned to enhance the Year 9 & 10 History courses. Specifically the First World War unit for the GCSE History syllabus, which makes up 25% of the final mark. Initially we are giving priority to those currently in Year 9 who have chosen to study GCSE History next year but in September we will be opening this up to those students who are intending choosing History as one of their options and therefore will be in Year 10 in October 2022. 
Year 8 students in Systems & Control have been creating transistor sensing circuits using a variety of sensors, including LDRs to sense either light or darkness, moisture sensors to sense dryness or moisture, magnetic proximity sensors used to sense the presence or absence of a magnet, ideal for security alarms.
