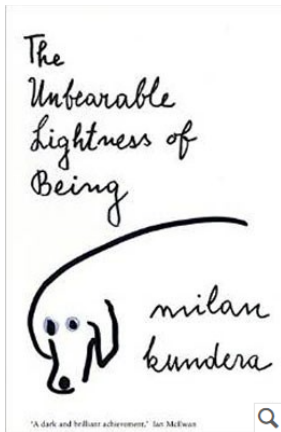


The Adventures of Tintin by Herge
