


Perfect Pitch: 100 Pieces of Classical Music to bring Joy, tears, solace, empathy, inspiration and everything in between by Tim Bouverie

Highly accessible and entertaining, Perfect Pitch is filled with engrossing stories and insights that bring to life 300 years of the world's greatest music.





# The Story of Music by Howard Goodall







So, I've written a book.







# Good Pop, Bad Pop by Jarvis Cocker








# How To Be Invisible by Kate Bush







# Introduction to Production by Robert I. Sutherland-Cohen




# The Empty Space by Peter Brook

Passionate, unconventional and fascinating, his book shows how theatre defies rules, builds and shatters illusions and creates lasting memories for its audiences.






# The Drama, Theatre and Performance Companion by Michael Mangan






