Next Sunday's Mass Readings Genesis 18:1-10; Psalm 15(14); Colossians 1:24-28; Luke 10:38-42 My dear friends, today's readings invite us to rediscover the heart of our faith, a faith that is near, accessible and lived out in love that leads us to eternal life. It is not about extraordinary feats, but about everyday choices to love, forgive and follow God's way. We are challenged not only to listen to the Word but to speak it and live it. The question is not, "Can we do it?" but "Will we choose it?" For the Word is already near; we need only say yes.

A young woman once missed her train while helping an elderly man who had fallen on the platform. When her friends reprimanded her later, she replied, "I can catch another train, but he might not have had another chance to be helped ". This simple moment captures the heart of the gospel passage taken from Luke, where Jesus is asked by a lawyer, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" The man knows the law: love God and love your neighbour. But still he seeks a loophole: "Who is my neighbour?" Jesus responds not with a rule, but with a story that flips the question entirely. A man is beaten, robbed, and left half-dead. A priest and a Levite, both religious, respectable figures, see him but pass by. Why? Perhaps they were thinking of their responsibilities at the temple, or the ritual impurity they might contract. They were probably focused on themselves, their duties, reputations, safety. Then comes a Samaritan, a cultural enemy, one despised by Jews. Yet he is the one who sees, stops, helps and sacrifices. He becomes the unexpected example of mercy. Jesus ends with a challenge: "Go and do likewise." This parable reveals the core of Christian spirituality: the path to eternal life is not found by turning inward, perfecting ourselves, or clinging to religious identity alone. Rather, it is found in turning outward, in loving the other, especially the one we least expect or even dislike. We're often like the priest and the Levite, busy with "good things" that cause us to ignore the best thing: love in action. Christianity, at its core, is a faith of interruption, where God's call often comes disguised as an inconvenience. The Samaritan shows us what divine love looks like: unexpected, costly and inconvenient. The question for us is not "Who is my neighbour?" but "To whom can I be a neighbour?"

This prompts us to go back to the question asked by the lawyer in the Gospel. What must I do to inherit eternal life? We need to die first. Death puts an end to human life as the time open to either accepting or rejecting the divine grace manifested in Christ. Even though man's nature is mortal, God had destined him not to die. Death was therefore contrary to the plans of God the Creator and entered the world as a consequence of sin. For us Christians, death does not unravel the original design of our spiritual life which is destined to be eternal. What is eternal life? Therefore Holy Mother Church teaches that, "Those, who die in God's grace and friendship and are perfectly purified, live for ever with Christ. They are like God for ever, for they "see Him as He is", face to face in the heavenly Kingdom and celestial paradise with Christ, in the company of the holy angels. This perfect life with the Most Holy Trinity, with the Virgin Mary, the angels and all the blessed - is called "heaven". Because of His transcendence, God cannot be seen as He is, unless He Himself opens up His mystery to man's immediate contemplation and gives him the capacity for it. The Church calls this contemplation of God in His heavenly glory "the beatific vision". (CCC1023-28). This beatific vision is eternal life and the ultimate end and fulfilment of the deepest human longings, the state of supreme, definitive happiness. Eternal life begins not in heaven, but here when we allow God's love to flow through us to the wounded beside the road. True faith doesn't avoid the broken; it stops, stoops down and heals. Like the Samaritan, may we see, feel and act with mercy, because, in loving the other, we find Christ and in finding Christ, we find life. May God bless us all.
